The requirements for registration as a psychologist are determined by the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA) under the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme.


A single set of requirements now apply, across all States and Territories, and it is important that students ensure they are familiar with these if they plan to practise as a registered psychologist. A minimum six-year sequence of education and training in psychology is required to become eligible for general registration as a psychologist in Australia.

This six-year sequence can be broken down into three steps:

Step 1: Three-year accredited undergraduate psychology sequence. Students need to make sure their course has this statement in the description: "This course has Australian Psychology

Accreditation Council (APAC) accreditation".

- Step 2: Fourth-year accredited psychology studies
- **Step 3:** Internship pathway or postgraduate study to general registration An additional fourth step is required for registered psychologists who wish to qualify for an area of practice endorsement with the PsyBA. This step is only available to those who complete the postgraduate pathway.
- **Step 4**: Registrar program for area of practice endorsement (www.psychology.org.au)

Australian Catholic University (ACU)

Bachelor of Arts - Psychology

The Psychology sequence (accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council - APAC) can be taken as part of the Bachelor of Arts. The Bachelor of Arts (Psychology) prepares graduates to work in a wide range of settings including education and training, human services and welfare, counselling, marketing and advertising, human resource management, business, and in research. The program also provides the necessary knowledge and skills to enable graduates to progress to honours and professional programs that are required for careers in health, counselling, and private consultancy. The Psychology sequence provides a comprehensive coverage of psychology, with more in-depth study in lifespan development, biological psychology, social psychology, abnormal psychology, individual differences, and research methods. A minor study in an Arts discipline is also completed.

Prerequisites Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English (EAL) or at least 25 in English other than EAL.

Victoria University VU

Bachelor of Psychology (Honours)

ATAR: 86.1

Prerequisites Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 25 in English (EAL) or at least 20 in English other than EAL. This four-year integrated undergraduate/Honours degree is designed to give you an understanding of human behaviour, motivation, relationships and communication. In the first three years you will complete majors in Psychology and Social Research Methods, and a minor in Communication Studies, Gender Studies, Sociology, History or Interpersonal and Organisational Skills. In fourth year, you will undertake advanced studies in quantitative or qualitative social research methods, professional practice units (psychological assessment and ethics) and a research thesis.

Progression to fourth year is dependent on meeting specific academic standards. If you successfully complete the first three years but do not met the specific academic standards, you will exit and graduate with a Bachelor of Psychological Studies.

Bachelor of Psychological Science

As part of your major studies in psychology, you will study a range of subjects which examine complexities of human thought and behaviour, including developmental psychology, cognitive psychology, social psychology, abnormal psychology, and personality. As part of your minor studies, you will have the option of studying a diverse range of subjects including philosophy, sociology, and historical and heritage studies.

RMIT University

Bachelor of Applied Science - Psychology

ATAR: 65.15

Psychology explores the science of the mind and human nature. You'll examine mental states and processes and how they affect human behaviour.

You'll gain strong theoretical and practical skills. The program is the basis for further study if you want to become a practising psychologist or use your study in other careers. Your studies will include the biological bases of behaviour including brain behaviour relationships, sensation, perception and consciousness, theories of learning, memory and cognition emotion, motivation and stress.

The course includes a research project where you work one-on-one with staff on staff-initiated research projects. You'll also have the option of completing a 15-day industry placement.

The psychology component of the degree is 25% of first year, 62.5% of second year and 62.5% of third year. Elective subjects may include information technology, nutrition, applied psychology, health statistics and computer science amongst others.

This course equips students to become frontline justice workers with a strong understanding of psychological theories and practice. Students learn to provide support services to offenders, clients and victims within the criminal justice system, particularly those with complex needs and mental health issues.

Students develop the emotional and intellectual resources required for a challenging, but rewarding career in the justice and human services fields including policing, corrections, youth justice, customs, child protection and welfare services.
